## **Helping Presenters Connect Creativity To Their Communities**

For the past twenty years, Drew has brought his teaching and performances to the unlikeliest of places and to a diversity of populations, making him ideal for tailoring a residency to communities large and small and for making the arts accessible, practical, and fun.

### Make a Silent Movie

Drew and a group of 6-12 students will produce a short silent movie in one week. Students will get an overview of digital filmmaking while writing, acting, and editing. The finished movie will be shown as part of Drew's public show, and the workshop participants will each get a DVD copy. Junior high through college.

### Reading, Writing, and Juggling

Drew combines circus skills with reading and writing exercises to connect movement and the written word. This arts literacy program was originally developed for Chicago at-risk youths in an after-school program. Ages 7-13.

### The Art of Foolery

Ideal for a school assembly, The Art of Foolery is a performance/lecture on creative problem solving in which Drew demonstrates where he gets ideas, the history of foolery, and how foolery can be an art. This educational and entertaining presentation can feature excerpts from Drew's shows, screenings of his silent movies, and a question and answer period. All ages.

### **Circus Skills and Performance**

Learn to juggle, balance, and perform. The main lesson here is that it's not what you do, but how you do it. Inspires confidence while introducing theatre and circus arts. 30-90 minutes. Ages 7 and up (can be customized for 3-6 year olds).

### **How to Think Like a Fool: Creativity in Life and Art**

Learn how to come up with creative ideas to solve problems or just to express yourself. Look at the world upside-down and see things you've never seen before. Can be tailored for businesses, high schools, colleges, and specific organizations (such as a writers' group).

### **Dramatic Foolery**

Community theatre groups, high school drama clubs, university acting classes, and professional performers can all benefit from this foolish and physical approach to acting. They will learn how to make comedic acting more truthful and serious acting more expressive.



## STAGE SHOW #1

"Help! Help! I Know This Title Is Long, But Somebody's Trying to Kill Me!" Created and Performed by Drew Richardson Directed by Avner Eisenberg (Avner the Eccentric)

Part One-Man Vaudeville Show, Part Whodunit, Part How's-He-Gonna-Do-It?

### **Audience**

This family-friendly show has been enjoyed by adults, college students, and kids.

Non-verbal for deaf and international audiences.



### Length

85 minutes

### **Description**

The show must go on even when a suspicious character has eliminated the entire cast! When every entertainer in a vaudeville variety show is mysteriously dispatched, Drew the Dramatic Fool must take over every role in the production, from a 36-ball juggling act to the old saw-the-assistant-in-half trick. If he fails? Let's just say that bad reviews can be murder. "Help! Help!" is a wonderfully comic examination of our deepest anxieties, from the fear of failure to the fear of death.

### **Director Bio**

Avner Eisenberg's show Avner the Eccentric was a hit of the 1984–1985 Broadway season. He appeared on Broadway in Ghetto and The Comedy of Errors, but he is probably best known for his portrayal of the scene-stealing holy man in the film The Jewel of the Nile. Avner continues to tour his one-man show internationally.





## STAGE SHOW # 2

## **Drew's on First!\***Created and Performed by Drew Richardson

A mixed-up variety show that starts with "The End" and ends 50 years later.

### **Audience**

For family and children's series, school bus-ins, and festivals. Non-verbal for deaf and international audiences.

### Length

30 to 60 minutes

### Description

The signs introducing each act get dropped and shuffled, and so does the show, the performer, and time itself. Juggling balls are found in a guitar case, props fall apart, and whatever can go wrong, will go worse. Only a Dramatic Fool can save the day by creative problem solving and never giving up!

\*This is a lighter, murder-free version of "Help! Help!" with many of the same routines.

## DREW'S

### BIO

#### Youth

As a youngster, Drew began performing magic and juggling to compensate for his shyness. Now he plays the fool to take advantage of his increasing baldness.

### **Training**

Drew's life-long personal tension between drama and foolishness gelled while studying Theatrical Clowning with John Towsen 25 years ago at Ohio University, where Drew received a B.F.A. in Theatre. He continued his studies in physical theatre with Jacques Lecoq in Paris.

### **Stage Solos**

Drew the Dramatic Fool has performed his solo stage shows in theaters and festivals all over the United States and abroad, from Austin to Austria. Drew has created six one-man shows including The Psychology of Clumsiness (twice picked as "Critic's Choice" by The Chicago Reader) and the current "Help! Help! I Know This Title Is Long, But Somebody's Trying to Kill Me!" directed by Avner Eisenberg (Broadway's "Avner the Eccentric").

### **Devised Theatre**

Drew has been involved in ensemble created theatre and performance pieces as an actor/creator in groups such as Brazen Theatre (Madison, WI), 89 Fighters (Philadelphia, PA), The Clownarchists (Chicago, IL), and Night at the Fights (Chicago). Drew has also toured with Squonk Opera and The Daredevil Opera Company. Drew recently directed Quest4Arts's NANO as part of a Mid Atlantic Arts Foundation Artist and Community grant.

### **Filmmaking**

Drew is best known as the first person in the 21st century to have new silent movies shown in major motion picture theaters across the United States. ("If Drew Richardson was born 100 years ago, there's a good chance he'd be a household name today."

Drew's first short silent moving picture, The Guy Who Lived on a Chair, was screened at The Chicago Short Comedy Video and Film Festival, Pittsburgh Film Kitchen, and The Silent Film Society of Chicago. His Theatre Etiquette 101 movies are currently being shown in performing arts centers as pre-show.

### **Teaching and Residencies**

Drew has been a guest teaching artist at such institutions as Point Park
Conservatory, the University of
Michigan, Roosevelt University, Columbia
College, and The Art Institute of
Chicago. Drew also taught "Improvising
Physical Comedy" at The Big Stinkin'
Improv Festival in Austin, Texas, and
"Creating Visual Comedy" at MotionFest
in Baltimore. In Chicago, he served as
clown consultant/instructor for 500
Clown Macbeth, Strawdog Theatre, and
Powertap Productions/Next Theatre Lab.

Drew served as Artist in Residence for the Chicago Park District and Free Street Theatre, where he combined circus skills, movement, and poetry writing to create performances with at-risk youths. At Little City Foundation in Palatine,







## TECH RIDER

### Basic technical requirements:

Proscenium or moderate thrust.

Minimum size of 20 feet wide by 15 feet deep, and at least 12 feet high.

General lighting wash.

Connection to sound system for iPod audio player, upstage center.

Outlet stage-right for an electric jigsaw.

One set of "stage to house steps."

Video projector, DVD player, and screen (performer can provide these).
